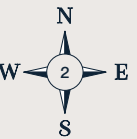

Life on board is intentionally simple, and space is thoughtfully shared. What you bring should reflect the ease and clarity of the experience ahead.



Boarding Times

Each leg begins and ends at 12 noon on the day stated in the schedule. Our arrival in the port of destination is generally one day early to allocate the necessary time for customs clearance and provide you time to reconfirm airline tickets, pack up, and do some exploring.



Arrive Early

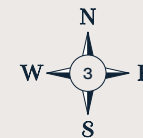
Please plan on arriving at least 24 hours before the start of your voyage. Spend the night(s) in a hotel, so that you'll have a chance to get over jet lag and be well rested and acclimatized when you come aboard.

Allow for Delays

This extra day means less chance of holding up the start of the trip because of late flights or baggage.

After the Voyage

You may want to consider planning a night or more ashore at our destination before flying home.



Luggage

Hard cases are not permitted on board. Only soft bags are allowed flexible, compressible, and suited for life at sea.

This keeps storage efficient, passageways open, and the atmosphere exactly as it should be: calm and uncluttered.

Soft bags are also far easier to move from shore to yacht by dinghy, where rigid cases are awkward and impractical on a tender.

It also means we do not have to sacrifice a cabin just to store suitcases — space that is far better used for living.



Clothing

Keep it light, but be prepared for a fresh sea breeze in the evenings and the occasional short, heavy downpour in certain regions. Add a layer for evenings, and something simple for onshore moments. Nothing excessive — every piece should earn its place.

On Deck

Quick-drying board shorts, a lightweight synthetic or hemp sport shirt, a long-sleeve layer for sun protection, and a wide-brimmed hat with tie-down.

Evenings & Cool Passages

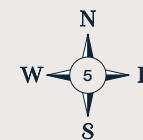
A warm synthetic sweatshirt for the breeze, with linen pants ready for relaxed dining ashore.

Women

A lightweight skirt, sarong, or dress — easy, versatile, and equally suited to shore time or a quiet evening out.

Rain

A light, packable jacket for the sudden tropical downpours that can arrive without warning.



Footwear

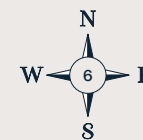
Barefoot on board is the norm and the preference. The deck is yours to move across freely.

For casual comfort

→ **Sandals**
Easy on, easy off

→ **Onshore & Reef**
A thick-soled pair is strongly recommended. Reefs and rocky shorelines can be unforgiving, and stepping in and out of the dinghy is easier and safer with proper grip and protection underfoot.

Essentials

A few personal items go a long way. These are the things worth remembering — everything else is already taken care of.



Documents

Passport valid for at least 6 months beyond your trip, plus 4 passport photos and 2 copies. Visa requirements vary by destination and nationality check visahq.com/visas.php in advance.



Sun & Sea

Quality polarized sailing sunglasses, reef-safe sun protection, swimwear in two sets, wetsuit booties for reef protection, and a shorty wetsuit.



On the Water

Mosquito spray with DEET, ear plugs for longer passages, and a small dive light with rechargeable batteries for night lobster hunting.



Cash & Extras

Bring cash for shore excursions, restaurants, provisioning fees and photos. Personal gear such as spear fishing equipment or surfboards is welcome if space allows — ask us first.

If you plan to spear fish, bring your own gear
Boat equipment cannot be replaced.

 Towels, bedding and basic amenities are all provided on board.



Diving

We run a full dive operation on board. Whether you're a seasoned diver or just getting started, you're in good hands.

Equipment

A full setup is available on board: air compressor for both 200 and 300 bar bottles, BCDs, regulators, and top-of-the-range fins and masks. Everything you need is already here.

Regional Dive Centres

In certain regions, we collaborate with local dive centres to operate our diving activities — giving you access to expert local knowledge and the best sites in the area.

Safety

Oxygen supply is on board at all times in case of emergency. Your safety is never an afterthought.

Your Own Gear

You're welcome to bring your own wetsuit, fins, mask, snorkel or regulator — but there's absolutely no need to. Our equipment is well-maintained and ready for you.



Medical

The yacht carries a comprehensive medical kit, fully stocked for offshore passages from wound care and seasickness to more serious situations at sea. We are not medically trained professionals, but we are experienced and well-equipped to handle most situations that arise on the water.



On Board

Our medical kit covers what you'd expect for extended offshore sailing: bandages, antiseptics, pain relief, seasickness medication, and more. It's there when it matters.

Personal Sensitivities

If you have specific needs allergies, chronic conditions, or personal preferences such as particular blister treatments or medication we encourage you to bring your own supply. This keeps our on-board inventory intact and ready for when it's truly needed.

Let Us Know

If there's anything we should be aware of before departure, please don't hesitate to share it with us. The more we know, the better we can look after you.

Before You Board

Drink plenty of water and get plenty of sleep in the days prior to boarding. This will ease any tendency towards seasickness and keep you in good spirits for the first few days at sea.



What's Already On Board

You don't need to overpack. The yacht arrives fully prepared — every detail considered before you step aboard.



01. Towels

Fresh linens for deck and cabin, always ready

02. Bedding

Comfortable, clean, and prepared before you arrive

03. Amenities

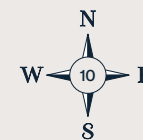
Sun cream, soap, shampoo, conditioner, personal water bottles, and cabin fragrances — the essentials are taken care of

04. No Need to Overpack

Everything you need for daily comfort is already waiting. Bring only what makes it personal.

05. Laundry

A washing machine is available on board, so there's no need to overpack on clothing. Pack light and let the yacht take care of the rest.



The Galley

The kitchen adapts to the flavours of each region we sail through. A full guide to our culinary approach can be found in the separate NAORA dining guidelines — but a few things are worth knowing before you come aboard.

Coffee

We take coffee seriously. Quality beans, properly prepared — whether you prefer it strong or slow, there's a cup waiting.

Tea

A selection of teas is always available, from classic to herbal. If you have a favourite blend you can't travel without, bring it along there's always room for a personal touch.

Water & More

Still and sparkling water are available throughout the day. Hydration on the water matters more than most people expect.

Wine

We source our wines locally wherever possible a natural extension of the regions we sail through. Alongside these discoveries, a curated selection of classic French, Spanish and Italian wines is always on board for those who prefer the familiar.



Technology

Satellite internet is available throughout the yacht at no charge for all members on board. It's reliable enough for staying in touch, sharing moments in real time, or handling anything that can't wait.

That said, presence matters more than connectivity. Some of the best moments happen when the screen is set aside and the sea has your full attention.

Something Small

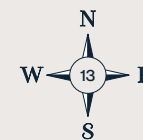
Whatever quietly makes the experience feel like yours

A Small Tradition

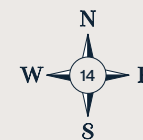


From each location along the route, a card is sent. A simple message handwritten, unhurried composed somewhere along the way.
